The Council of College and University Presidents (the "Council") will meet on October 27, 2005 to discuss the Unified Budget Recommendation. Prior to the meeting Commission staff ran several scenarios for the Council to be used in their discussions. At the meeting on October 27, the Council will decide what it will propose to the Commission for inclusion in the FY 2006-2007

Unified Budget Recommendation.

Commission staff and the Commission's Planning, Finance, and Accountability Committee will review the Council's proposal. If the Commission's Planning, Finance, and Accountability Committee agree with the

Council's proposal it will be forwarded to the

Commission as a whole as soon as possible after the meeting. If the Planning, Finance and Accountability Committee does not agree with the Council's proposal further discussions will be held with the Council.

Staff Recommendation: That the Commission approve the proposed program

merger.

Background: The University of North Alabama (UNA) currently has the

Bachelor of Fine Arts (BFA) in Fine Arts listed in the Commission's Academic Program Inventory at

CIP 50.0702 and the Bachelor of Arts (BA) / Bachelor of Science (BS) in Art listed at CIP 50.0799. The BFA program is on the list of non-viable core liberal arts programs, while the BA/BS program has met the viability

standard.

UNA proposes to merge the Fine Arts BFA program into Art BA/BS program. With the approval of the merger, the entry at CIP 50.0702 will be deleted from the Inventory. UNA is also changing the CIP code for the remaining Art program to CIP 50.0701 [see "Changes to the Academic Program Inventory" in this packet]. The merged academic program and the change in CIP code will put UNA's offerings in line with Inventory entries of several other institutions in the state.

UNA officials report that the BFA program is in fact an extension of the BA/BS program. One hundred percent of the BA/BS curriculum is contained in the BFA curriculum. A BFA student currently completes the entire curriculum of the BA/BS program plus 36 additional semester hours (sh) in studio classes. No changes are being made in program requirements, content, or objectives. Students in the merged program will be able to choose from existing concentrations in ceramics, painting, photography, sculpture, and digital media (formerly graphic arts).

The staff recommends that the proposed merger be approved as a reasonable extension/alteration of an existing program.

On March 12, 2004, the Commission granted Troy Background:

University (TROY) additional time in meeting the postimplementation condition regarding graduates for the Master of Science (MS) in Environmental Analysis and Management (CIP 30.9999). The Commission approved

the additional time with the stipulation that TROY demonstrate by October 1, 2005, that the program had met the post-implementation condition regarding the average number of graduates for the period 2000-01 through 2004-05. The requirement was that the program should have an average of seven graduates per year.

On September 28, 2005, the Commission staff received a report from TROY in fulfillment of the Commission's requirement. It stated that the program had graduated an average of 7.4 students per year for the period 2000-01 through 2004-05. A list of the names of 37 graduates for this period was provided by the institution.

With the submission of this report TROY has fulfilled all post-implementation conditions for the program.

<u>Background</u>: The University of Alabama System reports the

establishment of the Inflammatory Bowel Disease Center at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB).

The purpose of this center is to be a nationally recognized center of excellence for the integrated care of patients with inflammatory bowel disease. The center will be a cohesive multi-disciplinary center bringing together a number of recognized programs that currently exist as independent entities at UAB, including radiology, gastrointestinal surgery, pathology, gastroenterology, internal medicine, and nutritional science.

The incidences of inflammatory bowel disease have risen dramatically and an estimated one million Americans have some type of inflammatory bowel disease. Currently there is no center of this type in the southeastern United States. UAB is ideally located to serve as an inflammatory bowel disease resource, not only for Alabama but also for the entire southeast, providing clinical, educational, and research resources and opportunities.

The aim is to establish an interdisciplinary center of excellence in polycystic kidney disease-related research, with an emphasis on recessive polycystic kidney

disease. The main objective of this Core Center is to apply scientifically rigorous, state-of-the-art methodologies in a cost-effective manner that will advance understanding of disease mechanisms, enhance diagnostic specificity, and expand therapeutic approaches in polycystic kidney disease patients.
